

## **City Publishes First Popular Annual Financial Report**



he City of Fairfax published its very first Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR), which provides a snapshot of the city's financial activities during fiscal year 2024 (July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024).

The report includes key statistics and insights drawn from the city's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report and other sources. This information provides a clear picture of the city's funding sources, expenditures, and debt obligations, and highlights our commitment to maintaining a safe, welcoming, and financially sound community.

The PAFR program was created by the Government Finance Officers Association to help state and local

governments communicate complex financial information in an accessible and engaging way. The city plans to submit the PAFR for GFOA's award consideration and to join the esteemed "Triple Crown Winners Circle," an exclusive group of local governments with annual audits, budgets, and PAFRs recognized by GFOA.

#### **City Launches New Business License and Tax Portal**



City business owners must submit their annual commercial recycling reports to the city electronically by March 1 using a form on the city website. #### Wastewater Lateral Repair and **Replacement Reimbursement**

City of Fairfax Wastewater Utility customers, both residential and business, are entitled to reimbursement of expenses paid to repair or replace a lateral within public property. A lateral is the pipe that conveys used water from homes

and businesses to the public sanitary sewer main. Customers fund this benefit through annual payments of \$18 or \$36 per year.

In most cases, the City of Fairfax will reimburse customers for a portion of the cost of replacement of the entire lateral, on private property, from the home or business to the curb or sidewalk. Trenchless technology is strongly recommended.

Reimbursements may also be approved for the replacement of the entire lateral line from the home to the main line on public property or in the right-of-way or for repairs in the rightof-way only. Repairs on private property are not eligible for reimbursement.

Property owners must obtain contractor quotes and apply for reimbursement before work begins, even for emergency work. Info: fairfaxva.gov/publicworks, click on "Wastewater Lateral Repair and Replacement Program"

#### Curbside Leaf Collection Schedule for April

On Tuesdays in April, vacuum trucks will collect loose leaves raked to the curb in residential neighborhoods that receive city curbside refuse collection service. #### Real Estate Tax Relief, Rent Relief **Applications Due April 15**

The City of Fairfax provides real estate tax relief and rent relief for senior citizens and city residents with permanent and total disabilities. Virginia offers a real estate tax exemption for the primary residence of certain disabled veterans and their surviving spouses. Tax and rent relief applications are available from the Finance Department; please call for an appointment. Applications for city relief programs are due April 15. 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#### **Free Income Tax Preparation, Filing Options**

Qualified Fairfax City residents have options for free tax preparation and filing.

VITA — Households that earned less than \$67,000 in 2024 may qualify for free tax preparation service from the Volunteer Tax Assistance program. Sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service, VITA helps households maximize their tax returns and avoid the fees businesses charge to prepare taxes. In-person VITA services are available at several sites in Northern Virginia. Walk-ins are welcome, no appointments are needed. IRS Free File — Qualified taxpayers can prepare and file federal income tax returns online using guided tax preparation software. It's safe, easy, and at no cost to you. Those who don't qualify can still use Free File Fillable Forms. Individual tax filers, regardless of income, can use IRS Free File to electronically request an automatic tax-filing extension. 
#### **CONSENT AGENDA**

This project connects Waples Mill Road with Jermantown Road and includes bike lanes and sidewalks. It is funded with Smart Scale, RSTP, and NVTA 70% funding, with no local funds required.
- Approved, unanimously, 2025 special event requests under the City Council Road Race and Road Closure Policy. Approved events include The Asian Festival on Main, Ride of the Patriots, Running for the Kids, and the Turkey Trot 5K.

"A Loving Community" is a play with music commissioned by Virginia Opera as its educational touring program for the 2024-25 season. 

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Foster has 28 years of local government experience, most recently serving as deputy city manager for the City of Manassas, Va., until early 2024. His previous experience includes serving as director of public utilities for the City of Portsmouth, Va.; county administrator for Halifax County, Va.; and town manager of Altavista, Va. He holds a Master of Public Administration from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, and a Bachelor of Arts in Public Policy and Economics from the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Va.

Foster is leading the city through the fiscal year 2026 budgeting process and performing all duties and responsibilities of the city manager. The mayor and council will determine when to move forward with the recruitment process for the next city manager.

## **Title VI Complaint Process**

As a resident of the City of Fairfax, you are afforded rights, opportunity, and legal protection from discrimination under Title VI. You can expect to be treated fairly and equitably, to have access to decision-making and to share feedback, and to receive full benefits of services, activities, and programs without delay.

The city takes all allegations of discrimination seriously and commits to identifying, proactively addressing, and eliminating discrimination in all forms. You have the right to file a formal Title VI complaint if you believe that you — individually or as a member of a specific class of person — have been excluded from participating in, denied benefits, or subjected to discrimination and unequal treatment based upon race, color, or national origin, under any program or activity provided by the City of Fairfax.

Complaints must be filed no later than 180 days after the date of the alleged act of discrimination or in a continuing course of conduct, the date on which conduct stopped. The time for filing may be extended or waived in the interest of justice.

#### You may file your Title VI complaint in four ways:

- 1. Using the online form.
- 2. Downloading a paper complaint form and emailing or mailing the completed form to the Title VI coordinator.
- 3. Submitting your complaint verbally in person or via phone with the Title VI coordinator.
- 4. Submitting your complaint through the Fairfax City Resolve (311) reporting system.

Complaint forms are available in Spanish and can be translated to other languages upon request.

All complaints will be directed to the city's Title VI coordinator for initial review and action. The assigned investigator will issue findings in a report, and the city manager will inform the ccomplainant of the final decision in writing within 90 days of the complaint receipt. Complainants can appeal against the written decision within 10 days of the date of the decision letter. The privacy and identity of the complainant are protected throughout the process.

### **Digital Preservation Project Continues**

The Roy Rosenzweig Center for History and New Media at George Mason University is overseeing a project to create a digital archive of graffiti left behind by Union and Confederate soldiers at six historic sites included in the Northern Virginia Civil War Graffiti Trail.

The project is funded through a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The online resources created by the Off the Wall: Digital Preservation of Civil War Graffiti Houses project will provide insights into the lived experience of war in America from 1861-65. The archive will be available to scholars, students, and the public.
