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PERMIT PROCESS AND REGULATIONS - TREE REMOVAL

The Tree Removal Permit is governed by §6.10 and 4.5.9.D of the Zoning Ordinance

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS		
Q: Do I need a tree removal permit to cut down a tree on my lot?	 A: Ask yourself, Is the tree in a Chesapeake Bay Resource Protection Area (RPA)*? Is the tree in the RL, RM, or RH Zoning district*, AND on a lot ≥ ½ acre AND ≥ 5" in caliper (DBH)? Is the tree on a lot in the PD-R, PD-M, PD-C, PD-I, RT-6, RT, RMF, CL, CO, CR, CG, IL, or IH Zoning districts*? If the answer to any of the above questions is 'YES', a tree removal permit is required. * No vegetation may be disturbed in the RPA. The general location of RPAs can be found on the City's RPA Map, available online or at City Hall.

permit? Q: Can I cut down a tree that is on the property line between my lot and my neighbor's lot? Q: Do I need HOA approval to remove a tree?	 A: Maybe. If the base of a tree is partially on an adjacent property, you will be asked to obtain written approval from that neighbor. A: Probably. Prior to submitting anything to the City, consult with your HOA to determine their requirements. The City will notify the HOA when a Tree 	
Q: Can I trim a tree without a permit?	Removal Permit application is received. A: Yes, provided the portion of the tree being trimmed is on your lot and the work is performed from your property. Tree trimming should be carried out so as not to cause injury to the tree.	
Q: Do I have to replant a tree that has been removed? Q: What is 'required tree canopy/cover'?	 A: Maybe. In addition to maintaining the minimum tree canopy, some lots and developments are required to maintain trees installed as part of an approved site plan. Review staff will determine if the tree needs to be replaced. A: The minimum required tree canopy is the area of a lot that must be covered by the canopy of trees, as percentage of the total lot area. The required 	
	percentages are based on zoning district, as follows: Zoning District Minimum Canopy RL 25% RM, RH, PD-R 20% RT-6, RT 15% RMF, PD-M, PD-C, PD-I, CL, CO, CR, CG, IL, IH 10%	
Q: Does the City provide an arborist?	A: No, the City does not offer arborist services.

REVIEW CRITERIA

Before issuing a Tree Removal Permit, the City may consider the following criteria upon receipt of a complete application:

- The overall tree canopy, before and after the proposed removal.
- The condition of the tree(s) with respect to its health, imminent danger of falling, distance to existing structures, and interference with infrastructure.
- The number of species, size, and location of other protected trees in the area and the effect of the removal as it pertains to shade, privacy between properties, and scenic beauty of the area.
- The City may authorize removal if the tree(s) is unreasonably adversely impacting the use of the property. Mitigation may be required.
- Any potential visual impacts near public streets may require a review by the Board of Architectural Review.
