Rebuilding Together in Fairfax City—Fairfax Village in the City member Sigrid Schipper has lived happily in her 1953 ranch home for more than 40 years. But time takes its toll, and in recent years things in the house had begun to fail. Lights ceased to work, outside handrails became untrustworthy, and clothes came out of the dryer still damp. Sigrid, who lives on a fixed income, had to set priorities. Small repairs were not among them.

The last straw was when a fan fell out of a bedroom ceiling. She contacted the Village for help, and Village coordinator Jason Scadron

stepped in. He reminded Sigrid, who serves as a senior center rep on the Village Advisory Board, about a possible resource, Rebuilding Together.

This national network of 120 local nonprofits works with corporate and community partners to mobilize skilled volunteers for home repairs at no charge to low-income homeowners. In our area, the affiliate is Rebuilding Together-AFF (Arlington/Fairfax/Falls Church). Their primary focus in helping homeowners is health and safety. Sigrid was well within their annual income limits (\$68,500/yr for a single Fairfax homeowner; \$78,250 for a couple).

It took a while to fill out the application, which asks for a list of household members, verification of home ownership, and copies of two pages from the most recent federal tax return (with social security numbers inked out for privacy). Under "Repairs to be considered," Sigrid listed the bedroom fan and two loose outdoor handrails. As part of the approval process, a team from Rebuilding Together-AFF visited her home, along with Jason, to assess the needs in person.

Last month Sigrid learned her house would be part of the annual National Rebuilding Together Day, celebrated by affiliates this year on April 26. The volunteer team chosen to help her would include workers with specialized skills matching the needs identified at Sigrid's home. On the day appointed, nine of them showed up cheerfully and set to work.

The results far exceeded Sigrid's expectations. Not only did the team replace the two handrails (one even lights up now at night); they added a third railing for her side deck

steps. Some of the crew replaced the bedroom fan with a new ceiling light, installed a handsome overhead light in the kitchen, and replaced a missing towel rail in the bath. Others reframed two outside doors, rebuilt the threshold of the door from the kitchen to the basement, and replaced the defective dryer venting.

"I was happy with everything they did," Sigrid says. "The kitchen wasn't even on my list. And they were so nice about it. One told me my house is actually in good shape." She thinks other homeowners should know about Rebuilding Together. "Everything is bright and beautiful now," she says. "I'm thrilled!"
