1. Volumes – Annual Average Daily Traffic (2013)

- Layton Hall Drive = 16,000
- Brookwood Road = 14,000
- Rebel Run = 14,000

2. Accidents – Most Prevalent Locations

- North Street
- Layton Hall Drive
- Community Center
- Rebel Run
- Country Club entrance/exit

3. Speed

- Majority Driving <40mph
- Peak Speeding Period 10:00pm 5:00am

Accotink Creek to Fairfax Boulevard

- Consolidate access points to commercial development
- Add landscaped median islands, as feasible
- Improve pedestrian, bicycle and transit facilities

Layton Hall Drive to Accotink Creek

- Remain a two-lane road with safety improvements
- Study access issues for local streets
- Improve transit facilities

North Street to Layton Hall Drive

- Keep current configuration
- Enhance only pedestrian, bicycling and transit facilities





Transportation Land Use/Connections Technical Assistance Program

- Supports local governments in DC Metro region to improve transportation/land use coordination
- Provides communities with technical assistance to catalyze or enhance planning efforts
- Annual grant program
- 6 month projects
- City of Fairfax awarded grant for 2015


