Voice Your Opinion About Upcoming Transportation Projects

How we get from Point A to Point B impacts everyone, so the projects that improve our roads, sidewalks, and trails are vitally important now — and in the city's future.

“Every project we undertake in the city is part of a larger vision to reduce congestion and improve mobility,” says Wendy Sanford, transportation director for the City of Fairfax. “We’re creating a city where residents can reach venues like retail, dining, and the Metro and on bike, foot, or bus within 15 minutes. Making sure our roads, sidewalks, and trails are up to the task is a big part of this long-range plan.”

Before Sanford and her team apply for project funding to achieve this goal, however, they need feedback from residents.

There are three opportunities this month — focusing on three different proposed projects — for residents to offer their thoughts. *(Please see chart, right.)*

“It’s so important for city residents to offer their feedback on every project,” says Sanford.

She explains that the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has a competitive funding program for projects called Smart

Scale. “We plan to apply for these three projects in August, but the funding won’t come for six or seven years,” she says, “which is why we design projects that mirror the city’s master plan for mobility.”

The voices of city residents are essential to this process. “We truly want to hear all input,” Sanford says. “It makes a difference in everything we do.”

Election Information

Vote in the General Election May 1

Registered voters in the City of Fairfax may cast ballots in the May 1 General Election for Mayor (one position), City Council (six positions) and School Board (five positions). Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Election Day. Sample ballots are available online and from the General Registrar's Office.

At the city's six polling locations, voters must show a photo ID in order to vote. Those without ID may obtain a free voter ID at the Sisson House (adjacent to City Hall) during

regular business hours, as well as during voting hours May 1. Those without ID may vote a provisional ballot and provide an acceptable ID to the Electoral Board by noon May 4.

After polls close, look for election results on Cityscreen-12, the city television station; on the city website; and the Virginia State Board of Elections website.




Proposed Budget Discussion Concludes With City Council Meeting and Work Session May 2

Citizens are encouraged to help determine the city's financial priorities by participating in the annual review of the city's proposed budget, a detailed description of how taxpayer money is spent and explanation of the city's goals, programs, and activities.

The review process concludes with a work session and a public hearing and discussion May 2 by the Mayor and City Council. The meeting and work session will be televised on Cityscreen-12, the city television station; see the schedule on page 5.

Recycling Center Available for Residential Use

City residents are invited to use the Recycling Center at 3410 Pickett Road. Items are not sorted — simply place all recyclables in the recycling containers.

The Recycling Center is open from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily, but is closed on holidays observed by the city, including Memorial Day May 28.

Curbside Yard Waste: Paper or Plastic?

When bagging yard waste for curbside collection, consider using paper bags. Yard waste is used to create mulch (which is made available to the public), and the plastic bags debris becomes part of the resulting mulch product. Heavy-duty paper yard waste bags are available from area hardware stores. (Residents may continue to use plastic bags.)

Ride of the Patriots is May 27; Fairfax Boulevard Traffic Affected

Join Memorial Day observances with a hometown parade and the annual Ride of the Patriots May 27. This ride honors military and public-safety personnel and is a staging area for Rolling Thunder, a national motorcycle event.

From 5:30-10:30 a.m. May 27, eastbound Fairfax Boulevard will be closed from Eaton Place to Fairfax Circle to accommodate thousands of motorcycles expected to line up for the ride. During this time, westbound Fairfax Boulevard from Eaton Place to Fairfax Circle will become a two-way street.

The parade will step off at 7:20 a.m. on

eastbound Fairfax Boulevard from Capt. Pell's Crab House, 10195 Fairfax Boulevard, and will end at Patriot Harley-Davidson, 9739 Fairfax Boulevard.

Opening ceremonies begin at 8 a.m. at Patriot Harley-Davidson.

Beginning at 9 a.m., motorcycle riders will depart under police escort for the Pentagon.

Bleachers will be set up for spectators. Veterans groups will offer food and drinks along the bike lineup and in the Patriot Harley-Davidson parking lot.


