City Council to Hold Public Hearing on PVI Proposal June 12

The City Council has scheduled a public hearing on the proposed redevelopment application by IDI Group Companies for the Paul VI High School property at 10675 Fairfax Boulevard. Information: 703-385-7935.

The proposal, totaling about 18.5 acres, includes the entire school property, as well as two adjacent single family lots, all of which are owned by the Catholic Diocese of Arlington.

The current proposal includes a total of 301 residential units — including 137 townhomes and 164 multifamily residential condominiums — as well as 20,000 square feet of retail space.

The developer also proposes to retain 24,000 square feet of the existing school building for commercial, community space, or other use. Information: idigroup.com/project/paul-vi

The developer, IDI Group, has requested the city: rezone the site from CR/Commercial Retail, RM/Residential Medium, and John C. Wood House Historic District to Planned Development Mixed Use (PDM); allow a *Comprehensive Plan* amendment to modify the future land use map designation from Institutional to Business Commercial, Transitional and Residential - High; a special use permit for disturbance in the floodplain; and support for waivers from the *Public Facilities Manual*.

The Board of Architectural Review approved with conditions a Certificate of Appropriateness for the application on March 28, and the Planning Commission recommended approval with revisions at its April 23 meeting.

Bob Sisson Retires After Nearly Three Decades as City Manager

City Manager Bob Sisson, one of the region's longest-serving local government administrators, has announced his retirement effective July 1.

During Sisson's time as city manager, the city has consistently ranked in the top 10 places to live in the country, and recognition for the city's livability, safety, and services has steadily grown. Recent accolades have come from *US News & World Report*, ranking the city as the sixth healthiest in the nation—with criteria including residents' income, education, life span, access to critical services, and proximity to parks.

Much has changed since he began his tenure with the city on September 16, 1991, most notably the development and use of technology in city services and programs. However, Sisson always focused on the personal, ensuring that technology merely enhanced — but never replaced — personal attention from city staff.

The Mayor and City Council will immediately begin a process to select a new city manager with the aid of an executive search consultant. A new city manager is expected to be in place during the autumn.

City Council Adopts Budget for Fiscal Year 2018-19

The City of Fairfax City Council has approved the city's \$142 million general fund operating budget for fiscal year 2018-19, an increase of \$1.9 million (1.4 percent) from the previous year. The total approved budget for all funds is \$171.9 million, a 0.6 percent decrease from the previous fiscal year's budget. The city's fiscal year runs July 1 to June 30.

Personal property tax rates remain at \$4.13 per \$100 of assessed value — and, for qualifying disabled veterans and volunteer firefighters, 1¢ per \$100 of assessed value.

The real estate tax rate for calendar year 2018 was set at \$1.06 per \$100 of assessed value, unchanged from the previous year. Homeowners could see a .45 percent increase (about \$24 on average) in their 2018 real estate tax bills due to increased real estate property values.

The Commercial and Industrial (C&I) tax rate increased by 1¢ to 11.5¢ per \$100 of as-

essed value. C&I funds are used exclusively toward new transportation projects in the city. Real estate taxes are assessed and paid on a calendar year basis. As a result, commercial property owners could see an increased tax obligation of 0.4 percent, based on an increase in real estate values and new tax rates.

The real estate tax rate includes 2.75¢ dedicated to the city Stormwater Fund, which is an increase of .25¢ from the current year budget. These funds, included in the \$1.06 real estate tax rate, support aging stormwater infrastructure to meet current and future regulatory requirements.

The Old Town Service District tax rate remains 6¢ per \$100 of assessed value.

The adopted General Fund budget funds Capital Fund expenditures of \$6.5 million (excludes debt service of \$9.8 million on capital projects), representing 4.6 percent of

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Contractors Must Dispose of all Refuse, Debris Related to Their Projects

Whether it's lawn care or bathroom renovation, tree removal or electrical rewiring, contractors are responsible for disposing of their work-related debris.

When working with contractors, be sure waste disposal services are finalized before work begins.

Residential property owner "do it yourself" projects are limited to repairs and improvements that are initiated and completed by the property owner or household residents.

Projects cease to be "do it yourself" when they require labor and resources from additional, non-residential assistants (paid or unpaid). In these cases, the work becomes contracted work, and the city will not collect that debris from the curb. Information: 703-385-7995.

Tip and Toss Standing Water To Help Eliminate Mosquitoes

As warm weather arrives, so do mosquitoes, which can spread viruses such as Zika and West Nile.

“Fight the bite” by implementing a household mosquito control program, with help from the Fairfax County Health Department.

Tip and toss standing water — or treat standing water with safe larvicides — and carefully treat the yard with safe insecticides. (Keep butterflies and other outdoor friends in mind when treating.)

See if your home needs repairs: Install, repair, or replace screens on doors and windows.

Wear long, loose, light-colored clothing when outdoors. Remember: Mosquitoes are most active at dawn and dusk.

West Nile and Zika viruses can be spread through the bite of an infected mosquito. Know the symptoms and seek medical attention if needed.

General Fund expenditures.

The city is contractually obligated to pay for City of Fairfax Schools instructional costs based on a per-student formula. School tuition is budgeted to increase by \$691,907, or 1.4 percent.

City Council funded merit increases of up to 3.5 percent for eligible city employees. No cost of living adjustment (COLA) is provided in FY 2019; however, a 2.6 percent market adjustment was applied to employee pay scales to retain parity within the region.

Wastewater utility rate increased 10 percent to support the long-term capital improvement program of Fairfax County’s Noman Cole wastewater treatment plant, the facility where the city’s wastewater is treated.

The adopted budget will be posted on the city website by July 1, and a limited number of printed copies will be available from the Finance Department, City Hall Room 312. Information: 703-385-7876.

Good Fences Make Good Neighbors: Know the Rules

Property owners who wish to install new fences or walls on residential property are required to follow city regulations on placement, materials, and height before construction begins.

Property owners must build fences and walls entirely on their own property, so they should know property line locations (available on plats or from property surveys).

On corner lots, a fence or wall may not create a visual obstacle at the corner where front property lines intersect. The finished side of a fence or wall must face out to the public when the fence parallels a street. Fence designs may not include barbed wire or other hazardous materials. Information: 703-385-7820.

Fences between a residence and a street may be four feet high, and up to seven feet in

other locations (such as backyards) — measure on the tallest side of the fence or wall from finished grade to the top of the fence or wall, and include hand rails and similar safety barriers. Fence posts and decorative features such as lighting and finials may exceed the maximum height by up to 12 inches, provided such features are spaced at least four feet apart.

Please note: Homeowner and civic association bylaws may be more restrictive than City Code. Additionally, these rules are not applicable to retaining walls, safety fences for pools, tennis courts, or construction fences. Pergolas, arbors, or similar features are not subject to fence height limits.

City Code Limits Temporary Short-Term, Travel Lodging for B&Bs; ‘Air Bnb’ Rentals Not Permitted

Residential options for travel lodging and other short-term rental are popular with travelers — but homeowners should make sure they understand what City Code permits before taking in travelers.

In the City of Fairfax, residential property owners may not rent one or more rooms, or even the entire dwelling, for less than 30 days. In other words, private homes are for long-term residency and may not be treated like hotels or motels.

However, “transient accommodations”

are permitted in a residence established as a “bed and breakfast.” These facilities must be owner-occupied principal, single-family dwelling units.

To establish a bed and breakfast, property owners must apply for approval of a special use permit by the City Council through the public hearing process. The Zoning Ordinance is very specific about certain criteria, such as the location of the dwelling, use criteria, off-street parking requirements, and signage. Information: 703-385-7820.
